Report Title: Performance Report, Quarter 3 2020/21

Introduction and Background

Introduction

1. This report seeks to provide an overview of performance against the council's key performance indicators for Quarter 3 2020/21. The council's performance framework captures key performance data from across council services as it relates to the themes of the Recovery Plan 2020, that of Economic Recovery, Community Recovery, Place Making, Regeneration, and Infrastructure and Organisational Change and Workforce Development.

Background

- 2. The Recovery Plan 2020 was developed to put in place a framework to enable a timely and structured recovery from the economic and social impact of the coronavirus pandemic. The plan sets out to deliver a number of actions that will allow the council to re-configure how it works and can most effectively deliver services to residents and how, in collaboration with others, help mitigate the negative impacts of the pandemic on the local economy, communities and residents.
- 3. This quarterly performance report monitors the key performance measures set out in the Recovery Plan and by doing so forms part of a comprehensive and regular review of the plan ensuring our recovery remains focused and on track to deliver a timely recovery that is inclusive and ensures those hardest hit by the coronavirus pandemic are not disadvantaged.

Quarter 2 Performance

- 4. Commentary on individual performance indicators is included under the corresponding performance measure. As would be expected, the impact of the coronavirus pandemic can be seen on a number of performance indicators over the period as additional lockdowns and other preventative measures have altered economic activity and our ways of life.
- 5. With the vaccination roll-out gathering pace in Kent, Ashford has three vaccination centres operational, and rapid-result coronavirus (COVID-19) testing sites, for people who don't have symptoms open: Eurogate Business Park and Ashford North Youth Centre. Coupled with our continued work responding to the changing restrictions, supporting residents and businesses (detailed information available on our <u>Covid webpages</u>), we can hopefully see greater positivity moving forward.

											Parking income for Ashford and Tenterden car parks for Q3 was £267,506 this compares with £666,823 for Q3 in 2019/20.

Parking income is a significant income stream to the Council with budgeted income of just under £2.4m for 2020/21. Given the restrictions on movement and reduced footfall seen in our towns, car parking income continues to be significantly reduced. Overall, it is anticipated that car parking income could be down by £1.2m in 2020/21.

Free parking was made available in council-run car parks in Ashford and Tenterden on: Friday 4, 11 and 18 December from 3pm and Saturday 19 and Sunday 20 December all day.

Removal of cash transactions (Car Parks) report available from <u>Sept 2020 Cabinet</u>, which introduced the phased removal of cash from Council business in response to the wider changes we are seeing in society as a result of digitisation of services and COVID19. This will result in reduced costs including future replacement of machines as they reach end of life.

Edinburgh Road car park (ERCP) provides a large number of town centre parking bays, however it does not operate 24 hours a day and is closed in accordance with the operating hours. Due to the changing nature of Ashford town centre; namely the increase in residential premises being developed and the change in shopper behaviour linked to Covid-19 a review of this asset is necessary to ensure it is being utilised to meet these demands. <u>Dec 2020 Cabinet</u>

Since the start of the 5th November national lockdown, the Business Rates team and Economic Development Team have been administering a number of government grants to local businesses including Local Restriction Support Grant (LRSG) (Closed Addendum), LRSG (Closed), LRSG (Open), Additional Restriction Grant (ARG) (Discretionary), and the Wet Led Pubs Grant. This has been through the November National Lockdown and Tier 3 and Tier 4 periods in December. The teams are also taking forward schemes for the new National Lockdown from 5th January 2021. In total approximately £2.1 million of grant funding has been administered through over 1,600 payments to businesses for the periods of November and December 2020 to date.

Covid support administered to 2492 businesses with £27,775,000 directed through the small business rates grant scheme, and £1,351,000 through the discretionary grant scheme. More information on the support provided and available to businesses is available on our <u>webpages</u>.

More information on the prosperity of our local businesses is available within the Kent and Medway COVID-19 Economic Recovery Dashboard. <u>The Economic Recovery Dashboard</u> (XLSX, 1.3 MB). This has been developed to help support the economic recovery from COVID-19 in Kent and Medway. A report provides the current position on homelessness following the implementation of the Homelessness Reduction Act in April 2018 and the impact of Covid 19 in 2020/21 was taken to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee in October.

Officers continue to work from home and contact as much as possible is via telephone interviews or online. IT developments such as 'YOTI' digital signatures have been implemented to enable digital document signing.

ABC continues with the "Everyone in" campaign, launched by the Government back in March to bring all rough sleepers off the streets and into emergency accommodation. We have obtained funding to allow us to be able to do this. We are working on pathway plans for this group of people to move them on to long term secure accommodation and are hoping to start a Housing Led scheme in the near future.

Challenging time for the team, with 477 inspections due before the end of March. Recruitment to help the back log undertaken, including a contractor. Currently the team have ceased routine food hygiene inspections due to the Covid-19 restrictions. Instead, as agreed with the FSA businesses are being contacted by phone/email and prioritised by risk (remote inspections). Questionnaires are being used to understand how businesses are currently operating safely. One EHO joined the team 01/12/20 to fill the team vacancy. However on 07/12/20 another EHO left the team on a temporary basis to work on another ABC project. This vacancy will be backfilled in addition to the current contractor in place who is supporting with remote inspections.

We were stopped from doing visits by the FSA from April to mid July 2020, we recommenced inspection mid-August 2020, visits again stopped on 21st December 2020.

Further Covid related impacts included the need for heightened risk assessments before conducting inspections, additional PPE and changes to working practices. Inspecting under Covid safe measures at least doubles the time for each inspection.

The pandemic also saw an unprecedented number of new food establishments start up – many operating from home, we had not anticipated the number of new businesses, with 300 new small businesses registered over the period.
