## Comments

GALLOWS GREEN

I have made a number of objections to Wates Historic Landscape Assessment by RPS which has removed Gallows Green from this application site. There is no evidence to support this opinion and many old maps which indicate that it is within the site.

These maps range from 1769 Andrews Dury and Herbert Map, 1843 Tenterden Tithe Map and many later Ordnance Survey maps.

The original Ordnance Survey map of Kent was carried out and published in 1801

The map was titled An Entirely New & Accurate Survey Of The County Of Kent, With Part Of The County Of Essex was created by William Mudge in 1801 and is regarded at the first official Ordnance Survey map.

The map was commissioned in the 1790s to help defend England from a feared French invasion during the French Revolution. What made it different from previous maps, was the use of the Trigonometrical Survey which produced much more accurate results compared to previous techniques. As the name suggests, it covers the entire county of Kent, including many bits that now form Greater London, along with some of the county of Essex. The survey was carried out under the direct of Captain William of the Royal Artillery (based at Woolwich) and printed at the Drawing Room at the Tower of London. This map, which can be accessed on line for free shows Gallows Green clearly on the site. In my opinion Wates need to be advised that they are
